# The VILLage TRip. Welcome to The Village Trip 2022!

OW IN ITS FIFTH YEAR, the festival has grown from its original base in the West Village to include the East Village and now stretches from Washington Square to Tompkins Square. This year, it runs for two weeks, featuring more than 90 events—concerts, walks, talks, screenings, readings, special cocktails, cabaret, an art exhibition, and more. From bebop to Bach, Jack Kerouac to Eleanor Roosevelt, children's books to labor rights... The Village Trip is as rich and varied as the community it celebrates.

The festival will kick off with a free outdoor street party on Saturday September 10 with music provided by the **DAVID AMRAM SEPTET**, plus **DAVID KEYES**, **TILTED AXES**, and other surprise guests.

On Saturday September 24, come to Washington Square Park for our signature event, a free concert featuring **THE** 

# **KLEZMATICS**, gospel singer **JOSHUA NELSON**, and **REVEREND BILLY AND THE CHOIR OF THE CHURCH OF STOP SHOPPING**.

The Village Trip is a celebration of arts and activism—the wonderful and crazy stuff that has made Greenwich Village one of the greatest neighborhoods in the world for at least 150 years. It explores the past with walking tours, panel discussions, the inaugural Village Trip Lecture, and tributes to Village denizens like Phil Ochs and Charlie Parker. But its main goal is to honor the Village as a place where creativity still happens, music is played, actors trained, good trouble made, and *everyone* is inspired. The overlap of art and protest, hi-jinks and high ideals, is what marks Greenwich Village as such a vital place.

Mark Levine, Manhattan Borough President, has said: "It's really good news that The Village Trip is back – bigger than ever and going all the way to the East Village! There's so much amazing, eclectic culture in this community, which block-for-block has more artistic history than almost any other place in America. It's just wonderful. I cannot wait to attend the festival."

### William Anderson, Classical and New Music Director for The Village Trip

n my role as Classical and New Music Curator of The Village Trip, I'm forging relationships between the festival and a diverse number of outstanding performing artists and well-established new music organizations in the US and around the world, crafting events that work with our global. mission. The Village is an artistic gathering place, encouraging a "One Music" approach, such as we might hear on the radio when traveling in France – jazz, followed by Stravinsky, followed by Edith Piaf.

An example from last year, "Frank Zappa Calls Varese," at the Bitter End, celebrated surprising resonances between American psychedelia and French *symbolisme* and *modernisme*.

This year, Hilliard Greene and the Jazz Expressions will share a program with the Momenta String Quartet celebrating the friendship of Charlie Parker and German Jewish refugee Stefan Wolpe. Bebop and Wolpe both have an energy akin to action painting, very much of a piece with the abstract expressionists. Wolpe lived in the West Village and made a point of befriending painters and musicians who were creating something new and authentically American, and he found a way to meld those energies while remaining true to his Berlin and Bauhaus roots.

This year, Composers Concordance, Cygnus, The League/ ISCM, Cutting Edge Concerts, and Marsyas Productions are collaborating to create an extensive offering of Greenwich Village composers, performers, and poets. The Village Trip is now international. The Global Village Trip has scheduled several events in Europe over the coming year. Masha Kaléko, who lived on Minetta Street, had fled Poland for Germany, only to be forced out later by the Nazis. In November, The Village Trip's Kaléko Project will travel to Gdansk, Poland, for the Nove Fale Festival, and to Germany and the Passau Museum of Modern Art. Gamel Woolsey lived on Patchin Place in the 1920s and later in Churriana, near Malaga, Spain. She will be remembered through a concert at the Gerald Brenan/ Gamel Woolsey House in Churriana in April 2023.

At The Village Trip 2022, we proudly present what the great Leonard Bernstein called "the infinite variety of music." Come enjoy.

By the 1850s, the Village was a living art colony and by the time sculptor and heiress Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney established her first gallery in MacDougal Alley in 1907 there was an embarrassment of riches for her to choose from.

This group exhibition demonstrates that the arts continue to flourish across Greenwich Village and the East Village. Embracing oil painting, watercolor, analog and digital photography, the work in Framing the Village – the inaugural Village Trip art show – has been created by living artists who continue to be inspired by neighborhoods that have been a center of fine arts since the late 19th century.

The show's curator Marc Kehoe, a Village artist himself, promises an

exciting mix of compelling pieces by familiar names and by atpresent unknowns that strongly re-establish the creative spirit of Lower Manhattan.

### Labor Rights After the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire A Social Justice Walk with Historian Daniel Katz

On Saturday, March 25, 1911, at the end of the work day, a fire began on the 8th floor of the Triangle Garment Factory. Within thirty minutes,146 of the 500 workers laboring on floors eight, nine, and ten would die. Most were young immigrant women. The tragedy provoked outrage, union movement building, and led to political reform in New York and states around the country, eventually influencing Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal legislation of the 1930s.

Daniel Katz will lead a tour beginning at Cooper Union at Astor Place, proceeding to the NYU Brown building on Washington Place, the site of the fire, and up to Union Square, where the social justice legacy of the fire continued for a century. A portion of every ticket sold will go toward building the Triangle Fire memorial now under construction at the site of the fire.



### James Beard House Tours Sept 16 () tours at 12, 1:30 & 3:00pm (\$ \$10

Tour the Greenwich Village townhouse where chef, author, and teacher James Beard lived from 1973 to his death in 1985. One of the most significant figures in the history of American cuisine, Beard pioneered television as a medium for teaching the art of cooking and emphasized the use of fresh, local ingredients and American approaches to food. The ground floor of the Beard House served as his cooking school for many years and the building was a beloved site for the chef's frequent entertaining. After the establishment of the James Beard Foundation in 1986, the House hosted hundreds of the nation's most talented chefs and served as the venue for hundreds of dining events. Today, the Beard House plays an essential role in the Foundation's mission to elevate, celebrate, and support the people behind America's food culture and to champion a standard of good food anchored in talent, equity, and sustainability.

When Bob Dylan thumbed his way from Minneapolis to New York in January 1961, he was drawn by the siren call of Woody Guthrie, who was part of a folk scene with deep roots in Greenwich Village, where Washington Square Park had long been a gathering place for singers and guitar pickers.

Jesse Rifkin's tour examines the fabled Greenwich Village folk music scene of the 1940s, '50s, and early '60s, the venues, homes, and album cover locations relevant to artists like Pete Seeger, Woody Guthrie, Dave Van Ronk, Peter, Paul and Mary, Phil Ochs, Alan Lomax, Jean Ritchie, Alix Dobkin, Fred Neil, and Buffy Sainte-Marie.

Greenwich Village—fabled bohemia of avant-garde poets, painters, and assorted rebels-was also a vibrant creative crossroads for children's literature's greats. Greenwich Village has long been a place where people make plans to turn the world upside down. Since the late nineteenth century, the neighborhood has absorbed new people and new ideas in the arts, culture, and politics; marinated them in hope, humor and contentiousness; and then shared them with New York City, the USA, and the world.

Professor Snyder's lecture will explore three generations of Villagers who were part of this tradition: Puerto Ricans and Cubans of African descent who plotted to overturn the Spanish Empire in the late nineteenth century; activist women of the early twentieth century whose efforts as suffragists, socialists, and settlement

house workers set off decades of social reform; and the mid-twentieth century artist Chaim Gross, an immigrant from Austrian Galicia whose drawings and sculptures in wood, stone and bronze crossed international boundaries to present new ways of seeing women, families, acrobats, and Jewish culture. Together, their lives show how New Yorkers and their neighborhoods have been shaped by the world around them – and how Villagers have shaped the world.



### Women's Rights are Human Rights: Eleanor Roosevelt's Legacy

A panel, chaired by public historian Kathleen Hulser, will assess the legacy of Eleanor Roosevelt, a brave woman ahead of her time whose beliefs were shaped by her life in the Village.

Over the last few years, many aspects of life which had long seemed settled and certain are now under attack. Women's rights are being overturned by court rulings as right-wing politicians and activists seek to turn back the clock on seventy years of progress since the pill granted women control over their own bodies. What we had come to think of established norms now appear to be nothing of the sort.

First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt said it repeatedly as she worked in the early days of the United Nations chairing the committee drafting the Universal Declaration of Human Rights: Women's rights are human rights. This program presents historian Blanche Wiesen Cook exploring Eleanor Roosevelt's evolving notions of human rights which connect deeply to the time she spent in the Village with activists. Hugh Ryan, author of The Women's House of Detention will speak about how the history of the women's jail next to the former Jefferson Courthouse is full of little-known stories of activism and advocacy for the rights of women, lesbians, trans-masculine people and prisoners. A noted expert on human rights will discuss how the idea of rights is an expansive and living concept that takes different forms in different contexts.

The discussion will be introduced by Kathleen Hulser, public historian, who has taught the history of the Village at the New School, New York University and Pace.
